The 2020 virtual REP conference included 38 papers, and various panels focusing on advancing geography and social issues in Baltimore. Sincere thanks and gratitude go to the many tireless supporters and organizers of the 2020 virtual REP conference especially Joseph Wood, Conference Director and Professor Emeritus from the University of Baltimore, Professor Mark Barnes of Morgan State University, Professor Sarah Blue of Texas State University, and Professor Jeremy Tasch of Towson University. The EGSG excitedly looks forward to the in-person REP meeting in Baltimore scheduled for October 2021.

By now we all know that the 2021 AAG has also adopted a virtual format. I invite each of you to participate in the meeting as you are able. Although it is far different than the in-person meetings that we are used to, I can say from

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participation in the 2020 AAG virtual meeting and most recently in the virtual REP meeting that the experience is equally rewarding and valued by students and participants.

Finally, as the nation begins to see the end of the pandemic with the recent approval of and start of vaccinations, the scholarly work for many of us is just beginning as we examine the geographic questions introduced by this pandemic. Elizabeth Chacko (George Washington University) is co-PI on an interdisciplinary project, "Pandemics and migrant precarity: North-South dialogues" that is funded by the Social Science Research Council. The grant, which was awarded in summer 2020, brings together seven international scholars from the fields of history, economics, geography and sociology over the next two years to study migrant precarity. The collaboration is aimed at

developing an interdisciplinary methodological toolkit to study migrant precarity at a time of pandemics in the global context. By examining the world's largest democracies—India and the US—the working group will focus on low- and high-skilled migrants as an entrée to analyze the socio-economic-political and geographical dimensions of the COVID-19 crisis as it unfolds. Chacko also presented a webinar presentation entitled, "Whose Life Matters? Contextualizing Ethnic and Racial Discrimination," to Loreto College in Kolkata, India, in August; and also presented a paper, "Temporary Murals in Washington, D.C.: A Reflection on People. Politics, Power and Place," at the virtual Race, Ethnicity, and Place Conference in October.

José Díaz-Garayúa (California State University -Stanislaus) recently received notification of tenure and promotion to associate professor at California State University - Stanislaus. Díaz-Garayúa was recently appointed by the Vice President of Faculty Affairs to a steering committee that delivered in October a Forum that discussed the realities that faculty of color encounter in academia, and was also appointed to Social Sciences Steering Committee. the Additionally, Díaz-Garayúa continues as Co-Director of CASA, the Center for Applied Spatial Analysis, where he has been working with community members resulting in an ongoing project on Racially Restrictive Covenants. The web mapping application is in CASA's website (www.csustan.edu/casa). addition, In continues organizing GIS Day events. This year GIS Day was virtual. Community members presented ongoing research (for the GIS Day videos, with English and Spanish subtitles, please visit www.csustan.edu/geography/gis-day). This talk brought over 130 persons from over 45 zip codes, over 20 cities, and 2 states.

Wei Li (Arizona State University) has several updates in 2020, including: being a finalist in the Graduate College at Arizona State University for the 2020 Outstanding Faculty Mentor Award; becoming the Associate Director of Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion in the School of Geographical Science and Urban Planning at Arizona State University; becoming a member of the Steering Committee for Metropolis Asia with

the International Metropolis Project; and becoming a member of several American Association of Geographers committees, including the AAG Diversity and Inclusion Committee, the AAG Fellows and Honors Guidelines Subcommittee, the AAG COVID Response Task Force, and the International Councilor Subcommittee of the AAG National Council. Li was elected by the national membership of the American Association of Geographers (AAG) to serve as National Councilor for AAG for 2019-2022. Li and colleagues also received a CONVERGE working group grant, "COVID-19 and Vulnerable Populations: Perception, Prevention, and anti-Discrimination," through COVID-19 Working Groups for Public Health and Social Sciences Research, the NSF-funded Social Science Extreme Events Research Network and the CONVERGE facility, the Natural Hazards Center at the University of Colorado Boulder (the research team includes Angela Chen, Karen Leong, Wei Li, Sunny Kim, Sean Han, at ASU; and Weichao Yuwen, at University of Washington).

Paul N. McDaniel (Kennesaw State University) recently earned tenure and promotion to associate professor of geography at Kennesaw State University. McDaniel is also the recipient of the 2020 Ethnic Geography Specialty Group Early Career Award for Scholarship, Teaching, and Service. He recently became a member of the AAG Diversity and Inclusion Committee. McDaniel was also invited to join Welcoming America's Welcoming Standard Advisory Board, which is working on a 12-month review of the Welcoming Standard, the guiding set of principles that outlines the core of what it means for a community to be welcoming, particularly in terms of immigrant and refugee residents. The Welcoming Standard Content Advisory Board has approximately 50 members from the academic, nonprofit, and local government sectors. From immigrant inclusion to racial justice to public policy, the advisory board provides a broad range of expertise and feedback on the main pillars of the Welcoming Standard to ensure that it sets the bar for communities around immigrant inclusion; and also accounts for diversity in geography, politics, demographics,

Marie Price (George Washington University) is currently serving as President of the American Geographical Society.


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EGSG Member Recent Publications

Refugees in New Destinations and Small Cities: Resettlement in Vermont, by Pablo S. Bose

Pablo S. Bose (University of Vermont) recently authored a new book, *Refugees in New Destinations and Small Cities: Resettlement in Vermont*, published by Palgrave MacMillan. The publisher describes the book as follows: "For the last two decades, refugees, like other immigrants, have been settling in newer locations throughout the US and other countries. No longer are refugees to be found only in major metropolitan areas and gateway cities; instead, they are arriving in small towns, rural areas, rustbelt cities,



and suburbs. What happens to them in these new destinations and what happens to the places that receive them? Drawing on a decade's worth of interviews, surveys, spatial analysis and community-based projects with key informants, Dr Pablo Bose argues that the value of refugee newcomers to their new homes cannot be underestimated." Race, Ethnicity, and Place Conference in 2021 in Baltimore

The Xth Race, Ethnicity, and Place (REP) Conference, originally scheduled for October 21-24, 2020, in Baltimore, was rescheduled to October 2021, while a smaller online virtual conference focused on Race, Ethnicity, Place and the COVID-19 Pandemic was held in October 2020 in collaboration with the Middle Atlantic Division of the American Association of Geographers (MAD-AAG).



Information from repconference.org: "Join us in downtown Baltimore from October 20-23, 2021 for an invigorating exchange of ideas at the 10th bi-annual REP Conference. The 2021 REP Conference hosts are Morgan State University and the University of Baltimore. The conference theme, *Justice and the City in an Age of Social Division*, ties in strongly with current and ongoing struggles for civil and human rights in Baltimore. Paper and plenary sessions will be held on Thursday and Friday at the Hotel Indigo and the Maryland Historical Society in Baltimore's Mt. Vernon District. Intrepid walkers will have wide access to neighborhoods for self-

directed and formal field trips, and vans as well as public transportation extend the geographical opportunities to engage with people who know Baltimore. A pre-conference workshop building and supporting geography Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Minority Serving Institutions will take place on Wednesday, October 20, at Morgan State University. The conference location in downtown Baltimore is located close to Pennsylvania Avenue, Baltimore's once thriving black downtown and center of urban unrest in 1968 and 2015. You can compare Freddie Gray's neighborhood with white neighborhoods a stone's throw away and follow the sectoral pathways of black residential expansion. Learn about the city's racialized geography of housing, crime, education, employment opportunities, public health, food ways, banking, social services, and more. See where Baltimore's Hispanic population is clustering. Meet and talk with local historians, community activists and organizers, pastors, writers, and artists from Baltimore's underrepresented communities. **Explore** downtown Baltimore's thriving museums, bookstores, restaurants, and clubs."
